Mayor's Report for Town Council Meeting January 2025

Saturday, October 9th, Performance of Handel's "Messiah", by Atherstone Choral Society at St. Mary's Church, Atherstone

This was a very special occasion for the Choral Society as it was not only the 50th Anniversary of their performance of the "Messiah", but it was also performed at St. Mary's Church, where the Society's very first concert took place in 1974.

On arrival we were welcomed by the Chair of the Choral Society, Pru Allington-Smith. Having been shown to our seats we were pleased to see how packed the Church was with eager audience members.

Under the experienced baton of Kevin Gill, Musical Director for the Society since 2008, the concert was soon underway. Soloists included Alexandra Wynne (Soprano), Tom Lilburn (Countertenor), Dale Harris (Tenor) and Andrew Randell (Bass). Musical accompaniment was provided by Darren Hogg (Organist), Tom Peverell (Percussionist) and the Beauchamp Sinfonietta, from Leamington Spa, the "premier chamber orchestra in the West Midlands". The Choral Society were in fine voice and their singing of the awe-inspiring "Messiah" gave us all a very memorable and uplifting evening.

Sunday, November 10th, Remembrance Day Service at St. Mary's Church and Remembrance Parade to Atherstone Cemetery and War Memorial

There was a very good turn-out at both the Service and the Parade for this year's Remembrance Day. The Service was led by Reverend Michael Brandsma and amongst those in attendance were the Deputy Lieutenant of Warwickshire, Dr. Eric Wood, Rachel Taylor M.P., County Councillor Mejar Singh, Atherstone Town Councillors, members of the Police and Fire Services and of The Royal British Legion. Under the direction of Parade Marshal, DC Taf Evans, Standard Bearers entered the Church and placed their colours on the drum stack in front of the altar. Wreaths were laid near the altar and at the base of the drums. Towards the end of the service the standard bearers collected their standards which were then lowered to the "Last Post" played by the Bugler, Richard Moore, followed by a two-minute silence. A very moving and thought-provoking service.

The pews were packed with people - veterans, families and youngsters, including GFS, and the First Atherstone Scouts Group. At the end of the Service the Parade assembled outside the Church under the direction of the Parade Marshal. The Phantom Knights, with drums and brass band, led the way as the whole parade marched down to the Cemetery, where wreaths were laid at the War Memorial. I was privileged to lay a wreath on behalf of Atherstone Town Council honouring those who have served and sacrificed for us all. A number of tributes were made by members of the Scout Group. Once again the bugle announced a two-minute silence. At the end of the ceremonials at the Cemetery, I was honoured to receive the salute from the parade, on behalf of the town, as it returned to the Church and on to the Market Square.

The whole event seemed to go very smoothly. Well done to all those who were involved in the organisation of this very important event in the Town's calendar.

Friday, November 15th, Christmas Card Competition Judging, Congreve Walk, Bedworth

I was invited by Rchel Taylor MP to join her and several others from the North Warwickshire area to help her to select the winners of her Christmas Card Competition that had been running over the last few weeks. Primary school children across the North Warwickshire and Bedworth constituency had been given the challenge to design a Christmas Card on the theme of "Christmas in Parliament".

Finally, we were able to select the prize winners. I believe that an Atherstone Primary School did particularly well. Friday, November 15th, Atherstone Dramatic Society Act 2, Owen Street Community Arts Centre

Atherstone Amateur Dramatic Society Act 2, is the junior group within the Dramatic Society. The play they had been rehearsing weekly over many months was not one I had previously been aware of. It is called "DNA", by Dennis Kelly. The play is currently part of the GCSE and A Level English Literature Syllabus and is set in a modern context.

The young cast handled the challenge of this play extremely well under the guidance of Director, Sarah Collins and Assistant Director, John Parnham. The play is about a group of teenagers who believe they have killed a classmate. In order to avoid suspicion falling on them they devise a plan to create a suspect, which results in the Police arresting and charging an innocent man for the "murder".

The quality of the acting by the cast showed how hard they have worked over recent months to produce such performances. Particular praise is due to one of the leading players, Lucy Saunders, who must have spent hours learning her lines and delivered them faultlessly. There were a number of challenging themes in the play, not only for the young actors, but also for the audience.
